Our Chapter, Pi lota Chapter (PIC), Hong Kong, received a Certificate "Recognizing Outstanding Achievement for Service" for our outstanding performance in community activities during 2007. The program committee of 2007, which was chaired by Ms. Esther Wong, conducted a series of community activities, of which the Tin Shui Wai project was the major one. The accomplishment of the Hong Kong Chapter in Region I was honored during a special recognition event during the Leadership Academy in Indianapolis, USA on 25-27 September 2008. Ms. Esther Wong (Vice-president) and Ms. Ellen Ku (Counselor) represented PIC at the event and received the international award.

The following is a narrative summary of the Tin Shui Wai project – "LOVE & CARE THAT CHEER UP A BLUE TOWN".

Tin Shui Wai is a satellite town in Hong Kong. Much media attention has been drawn to the family violence, elderly depression and other social problems of its residents, many of whom are new immigrants from mainland China. Recognizing the needs of this community, our Chapter has been working in collaboration with a local organization, the Tin Shui Wai Women's Association and the Hong Kong Women's Development Association (HKTSWWA). With the theme "creating harmonious families through enhancing the core values of women", we started off with a fundraising event for this community, which we believe was unique as it aimed to examine and address the community needs and issues of new immigrants from mainland China. This fundraising activity was launched in January 2007 in the form of a performance of Chinese opera songs to an audience of 700. Donations of HK\$85,426 were collected and then used to run a number of courses on dancing, yoga, singing, knitting, handicrafts, haircutting, and cooking, as well as other medically related training for volunteers. These volunteers subsequently were able to serve over a hundred residents. It was hoped that through the learning and recreational activities, we would bring happiness and a sense of caring for each other to the residents and their families.

Accordingly, besides the fundraising activity, from July through November 2007 our Chapter conducted a series of seminars/workshops on specific topics that benefited the immigrants through training the local volunteers, who would then be able better to serve the residents. These workshops also helped to empower the volunteers, who were very much part of the community. Altogether, there were 175 attendees. The age of those who attended the programs varied from 28 to 72 years old. The topics included: 1) Household safety for children; 2) Care of bereaved families; 3) Management of depression; 4) Suicide in the elderly; 5) Accompanying patients to the clinic/hospital for follow-up visits; 6) Patient lifting and transfer; and 7) Wheelchair operation. The seminars were well received and feedback was positive. The findings from the immediate evaluation revealed that all participants valued their acquired learning and felt that all the topic areas had been extremely useful to them. All these volunteers started to serve the Tin Shui Wai District shortly after completion of their programs.

We believe that the success of the project lies in the number of participants at the workshops, the merits of the workshops, the pertinence of the topics, the more sustainable learning facilitated by the local volunteers who serve this community, and the fact that it was a collaborative effort with a local organization. Our Chapter also viewed this endeavor as our commitment to making a difference in the lives and health of immigrants, who need much support through health education, which also translates into individual self-efficacy. In turn, the nurses involved in this project, who trained the volunteers, displayed their ability to contribute knowledge and professional commitment in serving to better a community as part of the mission of our Honor Society. In addition, their involvement promoted the image of the Honor Society of Nursing.



International Symposium: Capacity Enhancement for Disaster Resilience

Our Chapter is collaborating with the School of Nursing, The Hong Kong Polytechnic University in organizing an international symposium "Capacity Enhancement for Disaster Resilience" on October 20-22, 2009, in response to the increasing need for disaster healthcare training. The event is partly funded by the "Professional Services Development Assistance Scheme" of the Commerce and Economic Development Bureau, the Government of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region.

The Symposium aims to bring together health professionals from around the world to share expertise, knowledge and experience on disaster preparedness, mid- and long-term care of disaster survivors, disaster resilience and disaster education, and to unite national and regional capabilities for better disaster preparedness, response and recovery. Internationally renowned experts have been invited to share their insight and experience with participants, representing a golden opportunity to strengthen the network of professionals in the field of disaster healthcare.

Following the two-day Symposium, there will be a series of thematic workshops. Participants who are interested in further exploring and developing their competency in disaster handling and preparedness are encouraged to join the workshops for practical simulation of disaster scenarios, experience sharing and open discussion with international experts.
